SERIES HISTORY First meeting

RED, WHITE AND BLUE: As part of the popular BeaverSalute promotion, Oregon State's Beaver logo on the helmets will be red, white and blue in tribute to active personnel and veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces. In addition, the Beaver logo at midfield will be painted red, white and blue and the goal posts will be wrapped in red, white and blue paps.

THE SERIES/GAME FACTS

- First meeting between the two programs.
- 119th football season in Oregon State history.
- Third straight year opening the season vs. a Big Sky Conference team and fourth in the last five years.
- Big Sky Conference teams appear on future Beaver schedules - Idaho State in 2016, Portland State in '17 and Southern Utah in '18.
- Weber State head coach Jay Hill and Beaver mentor **Gary Andersen** served together as assistant coaches at Utah from 2005-08. Hill began his playing career at then Ricks JC in Idaho, where he was recruited by then offensive line coach **Gary Andersen**.
- Beaver QB coach **Kevin McGiven** served as Weber State's offensive coordinator/quarterback coach from 2006-2008 - the Wildcats won the Big Sky Conference title in '08. Wildcat QB Cameron Higgins set the school record with 4,477 yards passing in McGiven's last season.
- Weber State passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach Fesi Sitake is the brother of OSU assistant head coach/defensive coordinator **Kalani Sitake**.
- Wildcat defensive tackles coach Kite Afeaki was the director of operations at Wisconsin in 2013 for current Beaver head coach **Gary Andersen**.
- Weber State secondary coach Cory Hall was briefly a graduate assistant coach at OSU earlier this year.
- Wildcat linebackers coach Lance Hunsaker was in the same position under defensive coordinator **Gary Andersen** at Utah from 2006-08.
- Weber State defensive ends coach Jason Kaufusi played DE for then assistant head coach **Gary Andersen** at Utah.

THE NEW ERA: For the first time since 2003 Oregon State will have a new head lead the team out of the tunnel Friday at Reser Stadium. **Gary Andersen** was introduced to Beaver Nation Dec 10, 2014 following successful stints at Wisconsin and Utah State (for more on Andersen look for the box in these notes). Friday also marks the first game since 2002 that OSU has a first-year director of athletics - **Todd Stansbury** was appointed to the position in June.

FIRST GAME: Oregon State head football coaches have been for the most part successful in their debuts. Overall the Beavers are 20-7-5 under a first-year mentor. Recent debuts include Mike Riley in 1997 (W 33-7 vs. North Texas) and 2003 (W 40-7 vs. Sacramento State), Dennis Erickson in 1999 (W 28-13 at Nevada).

2x1: Senior tailback **Storm Barrs-Woods** is on the verge of becoming the second player in Oregon State history to achieve 2,000 yards rushing and 1,000 yards receiving during his career. Barrs-Woods, who has already rushed for 2,183 career yards, needs 68 yards via the pass to reach that lofty accomplishment joining Jacquizz Rodgers (2008-10) as the only other 2,000 x 1,000 players in OSU history. Further, Barrs-Woods will become just the fourth player with 1,000 rushing yards and 1,000 receiving yards joining Pat Chaffey (1986, 88-89) and James Rodgers (2007-11).

3-4: During the spring practice session, head coach **Gary Andersen**, assistant head coach/defensive coordinator **Kalani Sitake** and staff made the decision to shift to a primary defensive alignment with three down linemen and four linebackers. It will mark the first time the Beavers have lined up in a primary 3-4 since the Jerry Pettibone era when Bronco Mendenhall, current BYU head coach, directed the defense in 1996.

NEW LEGION OF LINEBACKERS: While it is widely known the Oregon State defense replaces nine starters from 2014, the entire starting linebacker corps will undergo a wholesale replacement. The Beavers return two players with starting experience, **Rommel Mageo** and **Caleb Saulo**, who combined to start 10 games in 2013. According to a recent survey those 10 returning starts ranks as the sixth-fewest in the nation. It can be noted that **Jaswha James** has moved to linebacker this fall, but all seven of his career starts are at defensive end.

RETURNING O-LINEMEN: Oregon State returns all five starters on the offensive line for the first time since 2003 when Matt Brock, Brian Kilkenny, David Lose, Doug Nienhuis and Kanan Sanchez manned the trenches. This season, the Beavers have a group of linemen that started the final four games of 2014 together - **Sean Harlow** (LT), **Fred Lauina** (LG), **Josh Mitchell** (C), **Gavin Andrews** (RG) and **Dustin Stanton** (RT). In addition, **Isaac Seumalo**, who has started 25 games for the Beavers returns from injury after missing the entire 2014 season and is expected to fill in at right guard while Andrews will redshirt this season due to injury.

SENIOR CLASS: The Beavers are one of the most inexperienced teams in the country entering the season. OSU possesses 13 seniors on the active roster, which ranks as the youngest team in the Pac-12 and is tied as the ninth-youngest team in the nation.

GAME DAY — Beaver Sports Properties, a division of Learfield Sports, produces game-day radio broadcasts and special programming, syndicated on the Beaver Sports Radio Network. The 8-hour broadcasts consist of over 30 stations across Oregon and is anchored by the Portland flagship station NewsRadio 1190 KEX/Rip City Radio 620.

There will continue to be several options to complement local radio with football and men's basketball games available on XM Satellite Radio (official partner of the Pac-12 Conference), internet audio and video live streams via osubeavers.com.

THE JOE BEAVER SHOW — Each weekday from noon to 2 p.m. Mike Parker and Jon Warren host an OSU sports-themed show in the Greater Corvallis area on 1240 KEJO and is available worldwide on kejoam.com.

TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES: Twelve of the Beavers' 13 seniors are on track to graduate this academic year: **Gavin Andrews** (June/economics), **Lavonte Barnett** (March/sociology), **Storm Barrs-Woods** (December/human development & family sciences), **Kellen Clute** (March/digital communications), **Jalen Grimbale** (December/economics), **Jaswha James** (December/sociology), **Josh Mitchell** (December/sociology), **Naji Patrick** (December/human development family studies/public health), **Ali'i Robins** (December/sociology), **Larry Scott** (December/human development & family studies), **Caleb Smith** (March/liberal studies), **Shane Wallen** (March/exercise & sport science).

FRESHMEN QUARTERBACKS: Oregon State is the only team in the nation, per a recent survey, that has no quarterbacks with playing experience and has only eligible freshmen signal callers. The last Beaver freshman quarterback to start for the Beavers was David Moran in 1996. Moran started three games in then a wishbone system, switched to cornerback prior to 1997 and before that season transferred to Northern Arizona.

TWO QUARTERBACK SYSTEM: The last time Oregon State entered the season planning to utilize two quarterbacks was 2007 when the Beavers opened the year against Utah, where **Gary Andersen** was the defensive coordinator, with Sean Canfield and **Lyle Moevao** battling for the starting gig. Both signal callers played in each of the first three games with Canfield eventually seizing the job. However, Canfield suffered an injury late in the ninth game of the season at USC forcing Moevao back onto the field. Moevao led the Beavers to three straight victories, including OSU's last Civil War win, and a berth in the Emerald Bowl. In the bowl game it was Moevao who was knocked out of the game and Canfield came on in relief to lead the Beavers to the win.

THE DRIVE: The Oregon State and Utah football programs will be featured in the Pac-12 Networks' *The Drive: Pac-12 Football* this fall. The series begins in time for the Beavers' conference slate to get underway. Episode 1 airs Sept. 23 and covers training camp through the San Jose State game. Other episodes are scheduled for initial air dates as Sept. 30, Oct. 14, Oct. 21, Oct. 28, Nov. 4, Nov. 11, Nov. 18, Nov. 25 and Dec. 2. There will not be a new episode on Oct. 7 due to OSU's bye week.

TENTH ANNIVERSARY: The 2015 season marks the 10th anniversary of Mike Hass and Alexis Serna winning national awards. Hass earned the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver after making a then school record 90 receptions for a then Pac-12 record 1,532 receiving yards. Hass also earned First Team All-America honors by several organizations, including the Associated Press and Walter Camp Foundation. Serna captured the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker following a season where he made 23 of 28 field goal attempts and was perfect on 32 point-after-touchdown efforts. Both began their OSU careers as walkons.

15TH ANNIVERSARY OF FIESTA BOWL: The 2015 season also marks the 15th anniversary of the 2000 Beavers' football squad that won the Fiesta Bowl. After thrashing Notre Dame 41-9, Oregon State finished the season ranked No. 4 in the Associated Press poll. The 2000 team will be inducted into the State of Oregon Sports Hall of Fame this fall.

BEAVERS AT 109: Oregon owns the most victories in the Pac-12 Conference this century with 147, followed by USC (143/119 with vacated wins), OSU (109), Arizona State (104), UCLA (104), Stanford (101), Cal (92), Washington (87), Arizona (86), WSU (75). Non-traditional Pac-12 teams Utah has 124 victories this century and Colorado has 73. The Beavers hit the 100-win plateau this century in the Sept. 21, 2013 win at San Diego State. The previous 100-win stretch started during the 1966 season, ending with 1999 – nearly 34 seasons (365 games). This century's 100 victories were achieved in just over 13 seasons (168 games).

HEAD COACH GARY ANDERSEN

Gary Andersen, who led Wisconsin to the 2014 Big Ten Conference's West Division title and a berth in the conference's championship game, was named the 28th head coach of the Oregon State football program on December 10, 2014.



Andersen is 30-9 in his last three years as a head coach, highlighted by an 11-win season at Utah State in 2012 and a 10-win season at Wisconsin in 2014, where he was named a semifinalist for the Maxwell Football Club Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season. He brings to Corvallis a 49-38 overall record in seven years as a head coach and has posted four consecutive winning seasons.

He owns an 8-2 bowl-game record as an assistant or head coach, and was 2-0 in BCS bowls as an assistant.

Andersen is the total package. In addition, to winning conference championships and bowl games, his student-athletes are also very successful off the field, earning numerous conference and national all-academic honors. Wisconsin finished among the top 10 in the country for Academic Progress Rate (APR) in 2013 and for 2014 led the country with a nearly perfect score.

Andersen went to Wisconsin from Utah State, where he completely revitalized a program that had won just six games in the three previous seasons. The Aggies were 4-8 in Andersen's first two years, improved to 7-6 in his third and then won a school-record 11 games and the Western Athletic Conference title in 2012. It was their first outright league championship since 1936.

A native of Salt Lake City and a 1986 graduate of the University of Utah with a degree in political science, Andersen was a junior college All-American center at Ricks College in 1984, and a letterman at Utah in 1985 and 1986.

Andersen and his wife, the former Stacey Lambert, have three sons, Keegan and twins Chasen and Hagen. Keegan played tight end at Utah State for his father and is currently a graduate assistant at OSU after serving in the same capacity at Wisconsin in 2014. Both Chasen and Hagen are football student-athletes at Utah State, Chasen is a linebacker and Hagen is a wide receiver.

ONE OF EIGHT: Fifth-year head football athletic trainer **Ariko** (uh-REE-ko) **Iso** (EE-so) is one of only eight females in the FBS in charge of the athletic training function of their football programs. Jennifer Brodeur (Massachusetts), Sally Nogle (Michigan State) and Kelli Pugh (Virginia) also head football athletic trainers while Jennifer Brown (Eastern Michigan), Brandy Clouse (Georgia Southern), Mary Vander Heiden (UCF) and Dawn Hearn (UTEP) are sports medicine department heads.

RULES CHANGES FOR 2015: The NCAA has made several rules changes for the 2015 season, here they are:

*** Crew of Eight Officials:** An eighth official has been added on the field, the center judge (with the letter "C" on the uniform), is positioned in the offensive backfield opposite the referee.

*** Non-Standard Overbuilt Facemasks Are Illegal:** This is a facemask characterized by greater weight and closer spacing between the bars. Use of the facemask is a safety issue as opponents can easily get their fingers caught in the tight space. The NFL outlawed this facemask a few years ago.

*** Illegal Equipment: Player is Out for One Play:** If a player is found to be wearing a piece of illegal equipment the player must leave the game for at least one play and may not return until the equipment is made legal. His team may spend a timeout to keep him from missing a down, but the equipment must be corrected before he is allowed to play.

*** Resetting the Play Clock When the Ball is Not Ready for Play:** When the play clock begins its count from 40 seconds, on rare occasions the officials will have difficulty getting a new ball from the sidelines. In such a case after some period of time, the referee will stop the game clock and signal for the play clock to be reset to 25 seconds. In previous years, this was done after 20 seconds had elapsed. This has been changed to 15 seconds, to prevent too much time from running off the clock.

*** Setting the Play Clock After a Defensive Player Loses a Helmet:** The play clock is set to 40 seconds when a player's helmet comes off, the game clock is stopped, and the player must leave the game for one play. In past years, the play clock has been set to 25 seconds. Last year, however, there were a few situations near the end of a half where this happened with more than 25 seconds on the game clock; this forces the offense to have to snap the ball one more time when they were trying to run out the clock. Now the play clock is set to 40 seconds when a defensive player loses his helmet, and still to 25 seconds when it is a player on offense. This is also consistent with the rule for stopping the game due to an injured player.

*** Pushing or Pulling an Opponent off the Pile: Unsportsmanlike Conduct:** Player safety continues to be a major emphasis of the rules committee. Starting in 2015, if a player forcibly pulls or pushes an opponent off the pile, he is to be charged with unsportsmanlike conduct. Here's why this is important: if a player is flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct twice in the game, he is automatically disqualified after the second offense. The committee believes this will be a major deterrent to this kind of action, which can lead to more trouble and potential injury.

*** Sideline Warning Returns:** An important point of emphasis for the rules committee and the officials is keeping the sidelines clean. This means that players and coaches are not allowed in the restricted area---the space between the sidelines and the coaches' box and team area. For a long time, the first infraction led to a sideline warning, with no yardage penalty. After a few years the rule was changed to assess a five-yard penalty for the first offense. Now, the rule has changed back to a warning for the first infraction. No yardage penalty will result until the second offense.

*** Instant Replay: Blocking During an On-Side Kick May Be Reviewed:** One of the important rules about kick-offs is that the kicking team is not allowed to touch the ball until it has gone ten yards, unless a receiver touches the ball first. After it has gone ten yards, either team may get the ball. A rule that is not so well known is that the kicking team may not block until they are eligible to touch the ball. The instant replay official (IRO) has always been able to review whether the kick is touched. Starting in 2015, the IRO may also review whether the kicking team blocks before being eligible to touch the ball; if they do, it is a foul. The rules committee feels that because of the enormous potential for the kicking team to get possession of the ball as the result of blocking too early, the IRO should be able to review this play and possibly "create a foul" from the replay booth.

STUDENT-ATHLETE PROFILE: SHANE WALLEN

Shane Wallen might not see one second of action for the Oregon State football team this fall.

The senior running back hasn't played organized football since 2010, his senior year in high school. Realistically speaking, he's sixth or seventh on the depth chart, stuck behind Storm Barrs-Woods, Chris Brown and a handful of others who didn't have to sell themselves to the coaching staff for the chance to serve as scout-team cannon fodder for the next three-plus months.

He is the longest of long shots.

But he's also fulfilling a dream and honoring his late mother by taking the final step of a long, challenging journey that began five years ago after his final baseball game and track meet at Pleasant Valley High School in Chico, Calif.

"I decided to come out because it was ultimately a dream and a goal of mine to play Division I football," the 5-foot-11, 213-pounder said after a recent practice. "I knew that later on in my life I would regret it if I didn't try.

"I missed being part of a team, and having the ultimate goal of winning and competing every day. Football is a grind and a struggle, but it was something I really missed and wanted to be a part of again."

Many others have shared that dream. Unlike most, however, Wallen was in a position to do something about it. A student intern in OSU's strength and conditioning program, he worked with the team, was close to the players, and knew what it took to compete at the highest level.

He also had access to new head coach Gary Andersen and his staff.

"I jokingly asked the coaches about [playing]," he said. "One thing led to another, and now I'm out here," a full 30 pounds lighter and significantly more cut than when his quest began back in January.

"It's been difficult," he acknowledged. "Losing weight, getting my footwork right, getting faster and still maintaining my strength was difficult. But now I'm down to 205, my goal weight.

"When they told me I could walk on and play, it was truly a dream come true. I was lost for words, I didn't know what to say. It took a week or two for it to sink in and to actually realize that I would be out there living out my dream.

"The ultimate goal is to get on the field. But no matter how much playing time I get – even if it's one or two plays – it will have been worth it. This is a great staff they have made it feel like home and family."

Wallen's circuitous trip to Reser Stadium began in Aug., 2011, at Butte (Jr.) College in Oroville, Calif. Having received no scholarship offers out of high school, he hoped to rectify that by making his mark with the California powerhouse, the alma mater of former California star Aaron Rodgers.

Life intervened, however. Before the season started he learned that his mother, previously twice stricken with cancer, was now terminally ill.

"It had spread to her liver, kidneys and back," he said. "So I took it upon myself to [quit] football.

"I still needed to get my education, because my mom always stressed that. I took the year off," and spent the next 11 months helping care for his mother while also going to school and working to support himself.

"She was basically in bed all day," Wallen said. "I'd sit with her, talk with her, get whatever she needed and do whatever I could to be there with her.

"She took care of me growing up and unfortunately at her young age, it was my time to take care of her. I don't regret it for a minute. Spending that time with my mother was irreplaceable."

Vicki Wallen died on July 4, 2012.

Shane used her untimely death as an inspiration to accomplish bigger and better things.

"It made me a lot tougher," he said. "I didn't want the adversity I'd gone through to define me. I wanted how I overcame it to define who I am."

Wallen worked three jobs so he could remain at Butte and follow his mom's wishes to complete his education. One of those positions was in Butte's strength and conditioning program, as close as he could get to football without actually being on the field.

After graduating, Wallen transferred to OSU in Sept, 2014, as a junior, as an exercise and sports science major with an internship in the strength and conditioning program.

"I wanted to bring my talent and what I wanted to do in strength and conditioning to the next level, so I came up here," he said. "I am always pushing to be better. Everything I do is for my mom."

Wallen said his experience with cancer has made him empathize with others who have also been impacted by the deadly disease.

"Since that happened, I've reached out to many people ... if they needed someone to talk to, or if they needed any advice, anything like that, I'm more than willing to help them out."

Earlier this summer, Wallen was one of 11 OSU and Oregon football players who joined a group of youngsters whose lives had been impacted by cancer on a fishing trip on the McKenzie River, under the auspices of the Oregon Candlelighters and the Northwest Steelheaders.

Wallen, OSU teammates Malik Gilmore, Ricky Ortiz, Caleb Saulo, Jalen Grimble and Fred Lauina, the Ducks and the kids spent the day relaxing, swapping fish stories, and thinking about anything other than cancer.

"It meant a lot more to me than some others because I've have a personal experience with cancer," Wallen said. "Once I learned of the opportunity I had to go. It was a no-brainer.

"I got to meet these two kids, Cressey and Keylin ... I was on the boat with Kres all day, we caught a couple fish, we talked and had a great time. I wouldn't trade that day for anything.

"When the kids smile, laugh and you see their faces light up, it makes everything worth it. They're forgetting about what's going on in their lives, whether it's them [fighting] cancer, or their mom or dad or sister or brother died from cancer ... whatever it may be, they totally forgot about it for the day and that was the goal."

That trip wasn't a one-off; Wallen expects to re-connect with Kres and Keelyn at the Sept. 25 Stanford game. He'll remain in contact after that if they want to, and will return to the river with the Candlelighters in 2016 if he can.

"I'm not going to be a player next year, but if they ask me I'll be there 100 percent, no question," he said. "Giving back to those kids is the ultimate pleasure you can have."
