SERIES HISTORY ..... Oregon State trails the series 4-0

### THE SERIES/GAME FACTS

- Fifth meeting between the two programs.
- Michigan has won all four previous games, including the last time OSU played in the Rose Bowl – 34-7 UM win on Jan. 1, 1965. The other three games have been in Ann Arbor.
- Programs last played in 1986 in Ann Arbor, 31-12 Michigan victory. Michigan QB was Jim Harbaugh. OSU QB Erik Wilhelm attempted 64 passes in the then Beavers' "Air Express" days which stood as a school record until current St. Louis Rams' rookie QB Sean Mannion passed 66 times against Arizona State in 2011. Current BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall made nine tackles for OSU.
- **Gary Andersen** was the head coach at Wisconsin for the 2013 and '14 season, but the Badgers did not play the Wolverines.
- Michigan tight ends/special teams coach Jay Harbaugh is a graduate of Oregon State and was an undergraduate assistant coach (2008-11) for then Beavers head coach Mike Riley. Harbaugh signaled the plays from the sidelines to OSU's quarterbacks.
- This is OSU's first trip to the Eastern Time Zone since a 2008 venture to Penn State.
- OSU currently has Big Ten Conference foes on the schedule the next three seasons – 2016 at Minnesota, 2017 vs. Minnesota, and 2018 at Ohio State.
- Former Oregon State Director of Athletics Bob De Carolis (Aug. 2002-June 2015) serves in an athletics advisory role at Michigan. De Carolis' wife, Sandra, played softball at UM.

**ANDERSEN 1-0 AT THE BIG HOUSE:** Beaver head coach **Gary Andersen** was Utah's defensive coordinator when the Utes defeated Michigan in the season opener at Ann Arbor, 25-23, Aug. 28, 2008. OSU defensive coordinator **Kalani Sitake** was Utah's linebackers coach in that game and Beaver linebacker coach **Ilaisa Tuiaki** was a defensive graduate assistant coach for Utah. Secondary coach **Derrick Odum** held the same position at Houston when the Cougars traveled to Michigan in 2003. Offensive coordinator **Dave Baldwin** held the same position at Michigan State for games in Ann Arbor in 2004 and '06 – the 2004 game was won by UM in three overtimes 45-37.

**KEEP THE STREAK ALIVE:** Oregon State has won its road opener each of the last three seasons. In 2014, the Beavers traveled to the Islands defeating Hawaii 38-30 to open the road slate. OSU played a pair at home in 2013 before traveling to Utah where the Beavers needed overtime to knock off the Utes 51-48 in a thriller and topped then-No. 19 UCLA 27-20 in Pasadena in 2012.

**BACK AT HOME:** Oregon State returns to Reser Stadium for its next two games, Sept. 19 vs. San Jose State and Sept. 25 vs. Stanford. The 2015 season marks the first time since 2009 that the Beavers have played three of their first four games at home.

**CAMP WILLIAMS:** Earlier this summer 12 OSU football student-athletes spent a week at the National Guard Training Site in Bluffdale, Utah, for a crash course in leadership skills taught by the U. S. Army's 19th Special Forces Group. The participants learned leadership and teamwork skills and how to prioritize, sacrifice, brainstorm and trust, and how to synergize in small and large units for the good of the group, attributes that translate to the football field and to their professional and personal lives once they embark on a life beyond football after graduating from OSU. Players involved include: **Lavonte Barnett, Victor Bolden, Devin Chappell, Kammy Delp, David Henry, Fred Lauina, Rommel Mageo, Josh Mitchell, Cyril Noland-Lewis, Ricky Ortiz, Kyle Peko and Caleb Saulo.**

**2x1:** Senior tailback **Storm Barrs-Woods** is on the verge of becoming the second player in Oregon State

history to achieve 2,000 yards rushing and 1,000 yards receiving during his career. Barrs-Woods, who has already rushed for 2,246 career yards, needs 43 yards through the air to reach that lofty accomplishment joining Jacquizz Rodgers (2008-10) as the only other 2,000 x 1,000 player in OSU history. Further, Barrs-Woods will become just the fourth player with 1,000 rushing yards and 1,000 receiving yards joining Pat Chaffey (1986, 88-89) and James Rodgers (2007-11).

**3-4:** During the spring practice session, head coach **Gary Andersen**, assistant head coach/defensive coordinator **Kalani Sitake** and staff made the decision to shift to a primary defensive alignment with three down linemen and four linebackers. It marks the first time the Beavers have lined up in a primary 3-4 since the Jerry Pettibone era when Bronco Mendenhall, current BYU head coach, directed the defense in 1996.

**QB ON THE MOVE:** It didn't take freshman **Seth Collins** long to show his mobility and a very different skill set than Beaver fans are used to seeing. Collins dodged, dipped, ducked, dived and dodged his way to 152 rushing yards against Weber State. It is the most yards an OSU quarterback has ran for since Tim Alexander set the school-record of 205 rushing yards against Northern Illinois in 1996.

**GAME DAY** — Beaver Sports Properties, a division of Learfield Sports, produces game-day radio broadcasts and special programming, syndicated on the Beaver Sports Radio Network. The 8-hour broadcasts consist of over 30 stations across Oregon and is anchored by the Portland flagship station Newsradio 1190 KEX/Rip City Radio 620.

There will continue to be several options to complement local radio with football and men's basketball games available on XM Satellite Radio (official partner of the Pac-12 Conference), internet audio and video live streams via [osubeavers.com](http://osubeavers.com).

**THE JOE BEAVER SHOW** — Each weekday from noon to 2 p.m. Mike Parker and Jon Warren host an OSU sports-themed show in the Greater Corvallis area on 1240 KEJO and is available worldwide on [kejoam.com](http://kejoam.com).

**NEW LEGION OF LINEBACKERS:** While it is widely known the Oregon State defense replaces nine starters from 2014, the entire starting linebacker corps underwent a wholesale replacement. The Beavers return two players with starting experience, **Rommel Mageo** and **Caleb Saulo**, who combined to start 10 games in 2013. According to a recent survey, those 10 returning starts ranks as the sixth-fewest in the nation. It can be noted that **Jaswha James** moved to linebacker this fall, but all seven of his career starts entering the season were at defensive end. The starting combination of Mageo, Saulo, James and **Bright Ugwoegbu** combined to record 17 tackles, two TFLs, a sack and a blocked field goal against Weber State. Meanwhile, reserve backers **Jonathan Willis** and **Manase Hungalu** added six tackles and an interception.

**RETURNING O-LINEMEN:** Oregon State returns all five starters on the offensive line for the first time since 2003 when Matt Brock, Brian Kilkenny, David Lose, Doug Nienhuis and Kanan Sanchez manned the trenches. This season, the Beavers have a group of linemen that started the final four games of 2014 together — **Sean Harlow** (LT), **Fred Lauina** (LG), **Josh Mitchell** (C), **Gavin Andrews** (RG) and **Dustin Stanton** (RT). In addition, **Isaac Seumalo**, who has started 25 games for the Beavers returns from injury after missing the entire 2014 season and will fill in at right guard while Andrews will redshirt this season due to injury.

**FRESH FACES:** Oregon State had 16 freshmen (true and redshirt combined) play in Friday night's win over Weber State, the 10th-most in the nation on opening weekend. Among those new guys were three true freshmen — QB **Seth Collins**, WR **Paul Lucas** and RB **Deltron Sands**. In addition, 15 others played for the first time with the Beavers including transfers CB **Devin Chappell**, CB **Treston Decoud**, LS **Ryan Navarro**, NT **Kyle Peko**, and P **Nick Porebski** as well as redshirt freshmen OL **Drew Clarkson**, OL **Kamy Delp**, WR **Datrin Guyton**, DE **Summer Houston**, QB **Marcus McMaryion**, RB/TE **Ryan Nall**, S **Gabe Ovgard**, S **Adam Soesman**, LB **Bright Ugwoegbu**, NT **Kalani Vakameilalo**, CB **Dwayne Williams**, DE **LaMone Williams** and LB **Jonathan Willis**. Juniors K **Ian Crist** and TE **Brent VanderVeen** and sophomore LB **Manase Hungalu** also made their OSU debuts.

**SENIOR CLASS:** The Beavers are one of the most inexperienced teams in the country entering the season. OSU possesses 13 seniors on the active roster, which ranks as the youngest team in the Pac-12 and is tied as the ninth-youngest team in the nation.

**TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES:** Twelve of the Beavers' 13 seniors are on track to graduate this academic year: **Gavin Andrews** (June/economics), **Lavonte Barnett** (March/sociology), **Storm Barrs-Woods** (December/human development & family sciences), **Kellen Clute** (March/digital communications), **Jalen Grindle** (December/economics), **Jaswha James** (December/sociology), **Josh Mitchell** (December/sociology), **Naji Patrick** (December/human development family studies/public health), **Ali'i Robins** (December/sociology), **Larry Scott** (December/human development & family studies), **Caleb Smith** (March/liberal studies), **Shane Wallen** (March/exercise & sport science).

## HEAD COACH GARY ANDERSEN

Gary Andersen was named the 28th head coach of the Oregon State football program on December 10, 2014.

Andersen is 31-9 in the last three-plus years as a head coach, including 1-0 at Oregon State.

Named a semi-finalist for the Maxwell Football Club Coach of the Year two straight seasons prior to being hired to lead the Oregon State football program, Andersen has experienced success everywhere he's been.

He is 50-38 overall record in seven-plus years as a head coach and has posted four consecutive winning seasons.

He owns an 8-2 bowl-game record as an assistant or head coach, and was 2-0 in BCS bowls as an assistant.

Andersen is the total package. In addition, to winning conference championships and bowl games, his student-athletes are also very successful off the field, earning numerous conference and national all-academic honors. Wisconsin finished among the top 10 in the country for Academic Progress Rate (APR) in 2013 and for 2014 led the country with a nearly perfect score.

Andersen went to Wisconsin from Utah State, where he completely revitalized a program that had won just six games in the three previous seasons. The Aggies were 4-8 in Andersen's first two years, improved to 7-6 in his third and then won a school-record 11 games and the Western Athletic Conference title in 2012. It was their first outright league championship since 1936.

A native of Salt Lake City and a 1986 graduate of the University of Utah with a degree in political science, Andersen was a junior college All-American center at Ricks College in 1984, and a letterman at Utah in 1985 and 1986.

Andersen and his wife, the former Stacey Lambert, have three sons, Keegan and twins Chasen and Hagen. Keegan played tight end at Utah State for his father and is currently a graduate assistant at OSU after serving in the same capacity at Wisconsin in 2014. Both Chasen and Hagen are football student-athletes at Utah State, Chasen is a linebacker and Hagen is a wide receiver.

**FRESHMEN QUARTERBACKS:** Oregon State is the only team in the nation, per a recent survey, that has no quarterbacks with playing experience and has only eligible freshmen signal callers. Prior to Seth Collins starting last Friday's game against Weber State, the last Beaver freshman quarterback to start for the Beavers was David Moran in 1996. Moran started three games in then a wishbone system, switched to cornerback prior to 1997 and before that season transferred to Northern Arizona.

**THE DRIVE:** The Oregon State and Utah football programs will be featured in the Pac-12 Networks' *The Drive: Pac-12 Football* this fall. The series begins in time for the Beavers' conference slate to get underway. Episode 1 airs Sept. 23 and covers training camp through the San Jose State game. Other episodes are scheduled for initial air dates as Sept. 30, Oct. 14, Oct. 21, Oct. 28, Nov. 4, Nov. 11, Nov. 18, Nov. 25 and Dec. 2. There will not be a new episode on Oct. 7 due to OSU's bye week.

**TENTH ANNIVERSARY:** The 2015 season marks the 10th anniversary of Mike Hass and Alexis Serna winning national awards. Hass earned the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver after making a then school record 90 receptions for a then Pac-12 record 1,532 receiving yards. Hass also earned First Team All-America honors by several organizations, including the Associated Press and Walter Camp Foundation. Serna captured the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker following a season where he made 23 of 28 field goal attempts and was perfect on 32 point-after-touchdown efforts. Both began their OSU careers as walk-ons.

**15TH ANNIVERSARY OF FIESTA BOWL:** The 2015 season also marks the 15th anniversary of the 2000 Beavers' football squad that won the Fiesta Bowl. After thrashing Notre Dame 41-9, Oregon State finished the season ranked No. 4 in the Associated Press poll. The 2000 team will be inducted into the State of Oregon Sports Hall of Fame this fall.

**BEAVS AT 110:** Oregon owns the most victories in the Pac-12 Conference this century with 147, followed by USC (144/120 with vacated wins), OSU (110), Arizona State (104), UCLA (104), Stanford (101), Cal (93), Arizona (88), Washington (87), WSU (75). Non-traditional Pac-12 teams Utah has 125 victories this century and Colorado has 73. The Beavers hit the 100-win plateau this century in the Sept. 21, 2013 win at San Diego State. The previous 100-win stretch started during the 1966 season, ending with 1999 - nearly 34 seasons (365 games). This century's 100 victories were achieved in just over 13 seasons (168 games).

### WIN THE TURNOVER BATTLE, WIN THE GAME:

Over the last 138 games, Oregon State is 51-11 when committing fewer turnovers than its opponent, 11-36 when committing more and 15-14 when even.

**ONE OF EIGHT:** Fifth-year head football athletic trainer **Ariko** (uh-REE-ko) **Iso** (EE-so) is one of only eight females in the FBS in charge of the athletic training function of their football programs. Jennifer Brodeur (Massachusetts), Sally Nogle (Michigan State) and Kelli Pugh (Virginia) also head football athletic trainers while Jennifer Brown (Eastern Michigan), Brandy Clouse (Georgia Southern), Mary Vander Heiden (UCF) and Dawn Hearn (UTEP) are sports medicine department heads.

# A Close Fraternity

They comprise one of the smallest and closest fraternities on the Oregon State football team.

Living thousands of miles from home and family in new surroundings in a different culture has forged incredibly strong bonds between OSU's four American Samoan players, who rely on each other daily to adapt and ultimately thrive nearly half a world away from their native Pacific Ocean island home.

"We miss our family every day," redshirt junior defensive tackle Noke Tago said in describing the biggest challenge faced by the foursome. "We don't see them often, not like other players who get a chance to go home because they are from the states.

"It is sad for us but the thing is we have to get ourselves comfortable with each other, and have each other's back. We've created our own bond here as a family and a brotherhood that looks out for each other.

"We make it easier for us by creating our own family here. We get together, share our food, have chapel together, it reminds us of our chapel back home" in American Samoa, where family and God are the cornerstones of daily life.

OSU's four American Samoan football student-athletes are Tago; redshirt junior linebacker Rommel Mageo; redshirt sophomore offensive lineman Fred Lauina, and true freshman defensive tackle Elu Aydon. Tago, Mageo and Lauina are from Pago Pago; Aydon is from Leone.

They are all key components on the Beavers, who now feature more than 20 players and five coaches of Polynesian ancestry, one of the fastest-growing demographics in college football.

The Samoan football heritage runs deep. Approximately 30 American Samoans play in the National Football League and ethnic Samoan Junior Seau, who grew up in Southern California before playing at USC, was recently elected to the NFL Hall of Fame.

Pittsburgh safety and future NFL Hall of Famer Troy Polamalu was raised in Southern California and in Winston, Ore., but is also of Samoan ancestry. His cousin, Joe Polamalu, played for the Beavers in 1987-88.

"The kids from American Samoa are different from most Polynesian kids," said defensive line coach Chad Kauha'a'a, a Maui native who starred at Utah from 1993-96 before entering coaching.

"They come from a [remote] island with fewer luxuries than most of our Polynesian kids, who grew up in Hawai'i or in the states."

Understanding that subtle difference is just one of the reasons the Samoan Beavers said having coaches of Polynesian ancestry – Kauha'a'a, Kalani Sitake, Ilaisa Tuikia, Andrew Seumalo and Lyle Moewao – has given them a connection with the staff, even if those aforementioned coaches may be Tongan or Hawaiian, and not Samoan.

"We are all from different island countries but we are all Polynesian," Tago explained. "The coaches have done a really good job of becoming part of our family."

Added Lauina: "I like the way they bond with us. They have that Polynesian spirit. We're not all manly and tough, we show love," and have a tender, empathetic side too. "That's why I'm happy to have these Polynesian coaches, they understand."

Mageo said the Polynesian coaches can intuitively relate to where they come from, their culture, the importance of extended family, and other aspects of their heritage others might not grasp.

"That's the greatest thing, they care for you much more than as a player, they care for you as a person," Mageo said. "They truly understand the Polynesian culture, how it's all about family and God, centered on those two things."

"Any person from home who comes in here, they don't get that homesick because they have people who are very similar to back home and they understand our culture."

An example of that understanding was colorfully evident at OSU's football media day. The Polynesian players all wore their ielavalavas, a traditional sarong-like garment worn by those of Pacific Islander ancestry.

"That was a big deal, they completely understood" the reason why the players dressed that way on an important day, Mageo said. "They supported it, and it was a great thing."

Aydon said he appreciates the "straight-up honesty" from the staff.

"They do not hide anything from you. That's part of the Polynesian culture. If you are falling behind they will be there to pull you back up. If you are doing something wrong or right, they will let you know."

"They have been there for our parents, not just as coaches but as guardians. They look out for the kids from the Islands, and everybody else as well."

Kauha'a'a said OSU provides a great atmosphere for Polynesians because of the diversity on the team and the large number of Polynesian coaches and administrators on the staff.

"There is a lot of support to help them feel comfortable, and it helps knowing the culture and their needs," he said. "I know it's a good fit for those kids to be here."

"When we go into their homes their parents know it's not some guy who doesn't know what we are about. They know if they send their child with these coaches they will understand them, know how to treat them, and get them going in the right direction."

Like most incoming freshmen, Aydon was homesick when he first arrived in Corvallis for summer conditioning and other orientation activities. Unlike many of his teammates, however, he couldn't simply hop in his car and head home to Oregon, Washington or California for some parental TLC and a home-cooked meal.

It's about 5,000 miles between Corvallis and his hometown of Leone, American Samoa. So, Mageo, Tago and Lauina stepped in to act as their own welcome wagon.

"They have been like my family, welcomed me with open arms," Aydon said. "I miss home, but they comfort me and are there when I need them. I am very grateful for them and I'm thankful they are here for me."

"It has always been like that" in Polynesian life, he added. "We come from a very small island, with not many people. Seeing another Samoan, Tongan or Hawaiian, you know that bond is always there."

"You don't have to be blood-related" to be considered family, "and I really appreciate that about the Polynesian culture. The Polynesian family works together and we can give you what you need and what you want."

"Don't be scared, don't be afraid, we will be here with open arms and welcome you into our family."

Not being able to see your family very often is one of several transitions that are more pronounced for the Samoans.

American food is vastly different than traditional, exotic-sounding Samoan foods such as kale moa (chicken curry), homemade vegetable soups, smoky barbecue, taro, yams, potatoes, oka l'a (fresh fish salad), panikeke lapotopoto (round pancakes), umu (oven-pit-baked food), keke pua'a (bao), sapasui (chop suey), fa'apapa (baked coconut bread), paifala (half-moon pies) and puligi (pudding).

"We are Polynesian and can eat anything," Mageo said, laughing. "That was the best part, that's why we gain a lot of weight when we get here."

At home we just eat one meal a day. To come here where we eat four meals a day, that's a gift."

Driving, however, was something different altogether. There are only about 200 miles of paved road on American Samoa and the universal island speed limit is just 25 miles per hour.

"Back home you barely go past 30 or you get a ticket. Out here, cars are flying around," Tago said. "Back home we always roll the windows down. Here it hurts your ears because the cars are moving so fast."

"My first time in the mainland it was scary how the cars were going so fast; it was a shock to me that they didn't get into accidents, how fast they were going. But you get used to it and now it's like nothing."

Added Aydon: "The cars go so fast. It's cool to just sit in the car and watch other cars fly past you."

Other surprises include snow, and trains.

"I had never seen snow before until my freshman year," Lauina said. "I ran down from the dorm and jumped into the snow. I love the snow, I wish it would snow again."

Aydon noticed the train tracks that intersect campus along Washington Way. He knew what they were, of course, but he'd never seen a live train before.

"When I saw a train pass by, it was a great scene," he said.

Kauha'a'a said American Samoans are "naturally built for the game" be-



cause they are strong, physical, and used to hard work. They also value education.

"It comes from their upbringing," he said. "They don't head down to McDonald's or 7-Eleven to pick up something after school. They go to work on the farms to help support their families."

"Their parents support education and know that's the ticket to a better life. That's one of the things their families stress, that their child has the ability to play football and take advantage of the educational situation to benefit their lives."

Mageo, Lauina and Noke were already in the program when the new coaching staff arrived in Corvallis this past December. However, Kauha'aha'a made it point to meet every family when he was recruiting Aydon to make sure they all knew the new staff understood their culture, and was committed to seeing their children succeed.

"Aydon's family is a big reason he came to Oregon State, because of the trust we built with his parents, James and Faay, and his aunt Mary," Kauha'aha'a said.

"They instilled their trust in me to make sure their son gets his education."

About 95 percent of American Samoa's population (55,000) lives on Tutuila, the largest of the country's five main islands and two atolls. American Samoans are American nationals, but are not citizens unless one of their parents is a U.S. citizen.

They cannot vote in U.S. Federal elections, but are represented by a non-voting member of Congress. American Samoans have the legal right to live in the U.S. and can apply for citizenship after three months of residency by passing a test in English and civics, and by taking an oath of allegiance to the United States.

Tago said another big difference from Samoa is Corvallis's "peaceful" environment.

"There is peace for us," he said. "Back home some people are always looking for trouble. Every time I talk to my mom I tell her I chose the right place."

Added Mageo: "Where I am from some people are extremely prideful and they end up fighting. It's a pride thing. We are very competitive. It's not as peaceful as here."

Not everyone makes it as far as Tago and Mageo, academic seniors on target to graduate next June, or Lauina, an academic junior. Mageo said the combination of homesickness and the tougher academics often make it too big of an obstacle to overcome.

"A lot of the people who played high school football who I looked up to, you see them at the corner store, they are not doing anything, just sitting around," he said.

"I feel my people sometimes suffer from a small-island mentality, meaning they are just very comfortable where they are at."

"A lot of people come here, get homesick, and they go back. I want to try to change that. I want to tell my people back home that it's very possible" to step outside their comfort zone and succeed in a different environment.

"It has always been a dream of mine to play football. I'm grateful to be here. You can do whatever you want if you put your mind and if you put your heart into it."

Lauina also said it was a dream come true when he received an OSU scholarship offer and a chance to totally change his life. He had been considering a career in the military, another popular option for Samoans.

"I thought, 'This is my chance,'" he said. "Coming here, I had to change and experience a lot of new things that I had never been through, like the speed limit and the technology, and the time change."

"Now I've been here four years I'm adjusted to it and I like it. Now when I go back home I won't be able to adjust to my old ways," he added, laughing. "It's a new beginning and a new start for me, and I like it."
