Wolverines and Beavers

Michigan has posted a 4-0 record against Oregon State, including a 3-0 mark at Michigan Stadium. The only other meeting came in the 1965 Rose Bowl.

U-M has compiled a 44-24-1 (.645) record against Pac-12 schools; member of the conference at the time the game was played. This will be Michigan 70th all-time game against a Pac-12 school.

- Michigan leads the nation in wins (915) and is followed by Notre Dame (883) and Texas (881).
- The Wolverines (.729) trail the Irish (.732) in all-time winning percentage.

109th Season of Big Ten Action

- Michigan is in its 109th season of competition in the Big Ten Conference.
- The Wolverines have compiled an impressive 485-198-18 record in conference play and have claimed a league-leading 42 championships.
- U-M also leads the conference with 402 first-team All-Big Ten selections.

U-M In 136th Season of Gridiron Action

- The Wolverine program was established in 1879 when a group of 13 men fielded the first football team in school history and played a pair of off-campus games. U-M defeated Racine 1-0 at White Stocking Park in Chicago, Ill., on May 30, 1879, for the first victory in school history. The Wolverines tied Toronto 0-0 in Detroit to finish the year 1-0-1.
- U-M enters its 132nd year of uninterrupted gridiron action, with 1882 being the only season that the program did not play any varsity games.
- The Wolverines are the sixth-oldest football program in NCAA history.

Oregon State Series

- After a 29-year layoff, Michigan and Oregon State will renew its series on the Michigan Stadium gridiron.
- This will be the fifth meeting between the Wolverines and Beavers.
- Michigan hosted Oregon State in three regular season games at Michigan Stadium, winning all three affairs (18-7 in 1959, 41-0 in 1966 and 31-12 in 1986).
- The two schools squared off in the 1965 Rose Bowl game, with the Wolverines claiming a 34-7 victory over the Beavers to cap a 9-1 season in 1964. U-M finished fourth in the final national polls with their only setback coming 21-20 to Purdue.
- Michigan head coach Jim Harbaugh was the team's signal caller for the 1986 contest, throwing for 171 yards and two touchdowns as Jamie Morris gained 140 yards rushing.
- Oregon State is the alma mater of tight ends coach and assistant special teams coach Jay Harbaugh.
- Four players that hailed from the state of Oregon have donned the maize and blue in the 136 year history of the program, including All-American halfback Willie Heston (1901-04). The other three are: Ralph Hurlburt (1909-10), Fred Newton (1904-06) and James Wiley (1960-62).

Home Openers

- The Wolverines have a 112-18-2 record all-time in home openers.
- Michigan is 18-3 in their last 21 home openers.
- It took U-M until its fourth season before it played a home football game after starting a program in 1879.
- U-M's first home game came during the 1883 against Detroit (40-5 victory).

Michigan vs. Pacific-12 Schools

- The Wolverines are 44-24-1 all-time against Pacific-12 schools at the time the game was played.
- U-M has posted an impressive 34-13-1 mark against Pac-12 schools during the regular season, including a 25-6-1 home record and a 10-7 road mark.
- Michigan has posted a 9-11 mark against the Pac-12 in bowl games (19 Rose Bowl games and a Bluebonnet Bowl victory over UCLA).

The 2015 Schedule

- Michigan's 2015 opponents had a combined record of 88-67 (.568) during the 2014 season.
- U-M will play eight teams that played in bowl game during the 2014 season: Utah (Las Vegas), BYU (Miami Beach), Maryland (Foster Farms), Michigan State (Cotton), Minnesota (Citrus), Rutgers (Quick Lane), Penn State (Pinstripe), Ohio State (Sugar/College Football Playoff).
- Five of the seven teams in the Big Ten East Division played in bowl games last year.
- The Wolverines crossover opponents in the Big Ten West Division this season are Indiana and Minnesota.
- Three of the Wolverines five road games will be played in primetime. U-M suffered a 24-17 defeat to Utah in its season opener at Rice-Eccles Stadium at night. The 2015 team will also play its Big Ten opener at Maryland and will travel to Minnesota for a Halloween night game in Minneapolis.
- The Wolverines will host rivals Michigan State and Ohio State at Michigan Stadium for the first time since 1967.
- Michigan will not face a team from the Mid-American Conference for the first time 2012 and for just the second time in the past 15 seasons.
- All four non-conference opponents from the western half of the United States: Utah, Oregon State, UNLV and BYU.

The Team, The Team, The Team

- The Wolverines return 14 total starters (players who made six or more starts in 2014).
- U-M has eight returning starters on defense: LB Joe Bolden, S Jeremy Clark, DT Ryan Glasgow, DT Willie Henry, CB Jourdan Lewis, LB James Ross, FS Jarrod Wilson, DT Chris Wormley.
- Michigan returns six players on the offensive side of the ball, including four offensive linemen: OG/OT Ben Braden, OT Mason Cole, WR Amara Darboh, C/OG Graham Glasgow, RB Derrick Green and OG Kyle Kalis.
- Michigan had three players join the program as graduate students: defensive back Wayne Lyons (Stanford), punter Blake O'Neill (Weber State) and quarterback Jake Rudock (Iowa)
- Tailback Ty Isaac played in the opener against Utah after sitting out last season as a transfer student from Southern California.
- U-M has players on the roster from 23 different states this season, including 50 players from the state of Michigan and 23 from the neighboring state of Ohio.
- O'Neill is the lone international player on the roster, joining the Maize and Blue from Australia via Weber State.
- The 2015 roster includes seven players whose fathers played football at the University of Michigan: Jack Dunaway (Craig Dunaway), Allen Gant (Tony Gant), Joe Hewlett (Rich Hewlett), Jon Runyan Jr. (Jon Runyan Sr.), Jack and Jared Wangler (John Wangler) and Tyrone Wheatley Jr. (Tyrone Wheatley Sr.).

Offense:

- Senior fullbacks Joe Kerridge and Sione Houma return to lead the way for a corps of running backs in 2015. The duo paved the way for Michigan's running attack that gained 1,954 yards (162.8 yards per contest).
- Derrick Green returns healthy in 2015. In just six games a year ago, Green rushed 82 times for 471 yards (5.7 avg.) and tallied three rushing touchdowns.
- Despite starting just two games in 2014, De'Veon Smith rushed for a team-high 519 yards on 108 carries (4.8 avg.). He led the Wolverines with six rushing touchdowns and posted only 17 lost yards on those 108 attempts.
- Jake Butt leads a tight end corps that includes fellow veterans A.J. Williams, Khalid Hill and Michael Jocz. The group also welcomes first-year players Ian Bunting and Tyrone Wheatley along with Henry Poggi and Chase Winovich, converted defensive players from the spring. The tight end corps made 10 receptions for 107 yards at Utah, including an eight-catch, 93-yard effort and one TD from Jake Butt.
- The offense boasts a seasoned line with 82 starts from the starting five at Utah. Each of those players have recorded double-digit starts in their careers: Graham Glasgow (25), Kyle Kalis (17), Erik Magnuson (14), Mason Cole (13) and Ben Braden (13).
- Michigan's offense did not allow a sack for the first time since last year's Northwestern game.
- Seniors Jehu Chesson and Amara Darboh will give quarterbacks Shane Morris and Jake Rudock a couple of big-bodied targets. Darboh hauled in 36 receptions for 473 yards and two touchdowns a season ago, each good for second on the team behind Devin Funchess. Chesson had 14 receptions for 144 yards.

Jake Butt

- 2015 Mackey Award candidate; award given annually to the nation's top tight end
- Tied for the team lead with eight receptions totaling 93 yards and one touchdown at Utah; set new career highs in receptions and yards
- His eight catches are the most for a Michigan tight end since Jay Riemersma collected nine receptions against Michigan State in 1995.
- Scored team's first TD of the season on a 19-yard pass from Jake Rudock with 46 seconds left in the third quarter against the Utes
- Needs one reception for 50 in his career
- Team's top career receiver with 49 receptions for 539 yards (11.0 avg.) and five touchdowns
- Appeared in 10 games and made five starts as a sophomore in 2014; caught 21 passes for 211 yards and scored two touchdowns
- Named to the ESPN.com All-Big Ten Freshman Team after appearing in all 13 games with eight starts in 2013; recorded 20 receptions for 235 yards and two touchdowns on the season

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2015 (89 Years)

The football program is in its 89th season in the "Big House" in 2015, with a 407-125-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 265 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators.

Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927 -- 47,432,429 fans have watched the Wolverines play 552 games (an average of 85,928/game). The stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 258 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the *Chicago Tribune* Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.

- Harbaugh mentored two Stanford student-athletes to runner-up finishes in Heisman Trophy voting: Toby Gerhart (2009) and Andrew Luck (2010).
- Harbaugh is the only coach to win both the AP NFL Coach of the Year (2011) and Woody Hayes Coach of the Year Award (2010).
- Jim Harbaugh joins Gustave Ferbert (1897-99), Elton "Tad" Wieman (1927-28), Harry Kipke (1929-37), Bennie Oosterbaan (1948-58) and Bump Elliott (1959-68) as former Wolverine players to serve as head coach.
- Harbaugh is the second individual to serve as head football coach at Michigan and Stanford. Fielding H. Yost was the Stanford coach for the 1900 season (7-2-1 record) before arriving in Ann Arbor.
